## Happy Birthday, George!

» Mount Vernon, the first president's last home, celebrates George Washington's 275th birthday anniversary with special events all weekend. On Saturday and Sunday, samples of his favorite breakfast, "hoecakes swimming in butter and honey" cooked over an open fire, will be served from 9 to noon. "George" will be there to talk about life in the 18th century.

On Monday, President Bush is scheduled to attend a wreath-laying ceremony that begins at 10, followed by remarks at the Bowling Green at 10:15. The morning's events will be followed by music, drills and a battle demonstration by the Old Guard Fife & Drum Corps of the Third U.S. Infantry and the Commander-in-Chief's Guard.

Parades begin at 1:30 all three days, with musicians, farm animals and visits by the general. Mount Vernon will open Saturday and Sunday at 9 and Monday at 8. Admission is free on the Monday holiday. On all other days, it is \$13, seniors \$12, ages 6 to 11 \$6, younger free.

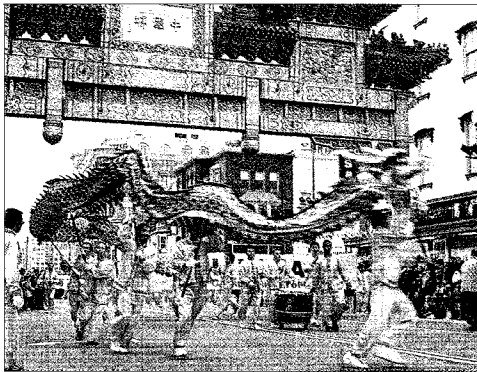

## Moving Pictures and Stills

"Moving Pictures: American Art and Early Film," the first exhibition to compare realist paintings of the late 19th and early 20th centuries with early experiments in film, opens Saturday at the Phillips Collection. More than 40 monitors will screen 60 short films by Thomas Edison, the Lumiere brothers and other pioneers that show Niagara Falls, Venetian canals, boxing bouts and other subjects with displays of paintings and illustrations of similar scenes by Thomas Eakins, John Singer Sargent and other artists. Tickets cost \$12, seniors and students \$10, ages 18 and younger free.

## The Old Becomes New

Visiting the Kennedy Center for the first time since 2002, Moscow's fabled Bolshoi Ballet stages evening-length productions of two classic story ballets starting Wednesday in the Opera House. "Cinderella" is the American premiere of a contemporary adaptation of the familiar fairy tale, set to Prokofiev's score. Marius Petipa's "Don Quixote" is a Mediterranean retelling of the story of the romantic hero. Tickets cost \$47 to \$125.
